The Easter Service at the Minster was held on Tuesday afternoon this week.

The Easter Bunny is not forgotten however, and we distributed Gingerbread Men to the children on Monday. Upcoming events for the new term include an International Food Fayre, where we hope people will bring and share their favourite international dish from 5pm on 20th April. This is part of the 'Norfolk Welcomes' event being run across the county to celebrate our county which has welcomed refugees in need including famous scientists and Norwich City Football players!

Later in the summer, in the evening, we will be running a traditional Beetle Drive for parents and carers, children and staff. Of course, there will also be the Summer Fayre, where this year, we hope to have a roller skating ring, a climbing wall and zorbs!

Island Migration Project

Four children from Y5 and Y6 are involved in a community project called the Island Migration project. This involves working closely alongside local artists who are researching the history of families that have moved to Great Yarmouth and had a positive impact on the town.

The children are attending evening research group sessions at the library and have visited the Time and Tide museum. They will be having the stories they find made into clay models for an exhibition in September. In the Summer Term, the artists will be arranging workshops at the school for parents and children to attend, where they can create a clay model depicting their own family story.



SCIENCE FAIR



On Friday 16th March KS2 spent the afternoon taking part in science experiments as part of British Science Week. Across the Key Stage we completed experiments in different areas of science including: making circuits using light bulbs, buzzers and switches; making a battery using lemons, copper coins, zinc screws and LED bulbs; making and flying helicopters and rockets; filtering water and stones and making walking junkbots. Everyone had a good time and our parents said they really enjoyed taking part in the experiments with us.

Highlights of the Y5 Spring Project....

We had a fantastic project launch involving visiting the Beaconsfield Playground when the children had the opportunity to fly a variety of kite designs (from traditional box and diamond kites to a modern 'octopus' kite). The children were running around for an hour—they were pretty tired by the end! Even a young lady in a wheelchair, after having had an operation on her foot, got to fly a kite too!

This enabled the children to decide which style of kite they felt was the easiest to fly, influencing their kite design when making them during the spring, using their design and technology skills. The kite-making incorporated skills such as the safe handling of saws, accurately measuring kite-supports, the surface area of a kite and creating a design for it in the style of Mondrian.

The culmination of the project was a kite flying competition with prizes for the best 'Mondrian' design, which kite flies the highest and which kite flies for the longest time.

Highlights of the Y1 Spring Project: 'Who helps those who help us'

has been our visit to the Caister Lifeboat shed. We learnt a lot about sea and beach safety, the children went on their first ever coach ride and haven't stopped talking about it since!

Another highlight has been the visit from the fire fighters when we learnt who to call when in danger and got to sit in the fire engine!

A group of children from Priory attended the Voice in a Million concert in London on the 15th March. They were a complete credit to the school and community. Well done everyone!
