A word from Mrs Grimmer

All of us here at Priory do hope that everyone is keeping safe and well. It has been absolutely lovely to welcome back some of the children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 as well as continuing to look after our key worker children. The children seem very happy to be back in school and have behaved extremely well in following the new routines. All of the staff are delighted to see them again. It has also been fantastic to hear about the great learning that has been happening at home so a huge thank you to everyone for your support.

The safety of everyone in our school and community is extremely important to us and as such we have put lots of measures into place in order to follow government guidelines as we welcome back more children. We are also carefully and regularly reviewing procedures as we want parents and children to feel confident that school is a safe place to return to as we move forward.



The children have been put into year group 'Bubbles'. Bubbles are taught by the same staff and in line with Government guidance, there is no mixing of Bubbles and children are not allowed to move from one Bubble to another. Each Bubble has its own start time/finish time, entrance gate/exit gate to the school, class space/play space and toilets. Classes have been cleared to ensure that only a few resources are available for the children to use, so that they can be cleaned thoroughly. Children have their own resources to use and we have close monitoring of hygiene procedures in school. All children are being encouraged to wash their hands regularly and to observe social distancing. We are also trying to reduce the amount of things children bring in to school to reduce the spread of infection Therefore they should NOT bring any bags, books, food or other equipment to school.

Social distancing is in effect as is the use of PPE on the school site. Please can parents and careers support our safety measures by adhering to the social distancing measures whilst



waiting to drop off and collect their children We appreciate that we are asking parents to drop off and pick up children at different times but this is in line with government advice and is in place again to support the safety of all members of our school community. Over the next few weeks, we will be looking carefully at how we can safely bring back more children into school, when it is possible to do so. Parents will be contacted to discuss whether or not they wish their children to return. We will be continuing to provide home learning resources for those parents who choose not to send children back to school.



We are also very aware of the need to support children who are moving on to high school and have been communicating with our colleagues in other schools to ensure that the best possible arrangements are put in place. Similarly we are looking forward to welcoming some new children into our reception unit from September and are busy preparing information for parents. Reports have been prepared and will be with you shortly.

It is my intention that of the staff and governors at Priory to consistently strive to do the best we can to serve our community. Thank you for all the positive comments you have made about members of staff who have supported both families and children during this time. It means a great deal to them and we have very much enjoyed having increased contact with parents and carers. It is essential that we take forward into the future the positive working relationships that we have developed and to continue to recognise how important your contributions are.
